An update on Dog Parks:

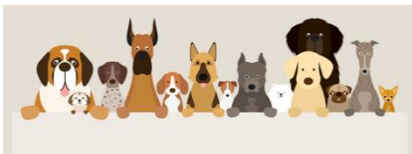
We're so often asked "Doesn't it make the most sense to have a dog park at Canoa Hills Trails Park and/or Historic Canoa Ranch?"

At a recent "Friends of the Parks" meeting, we asked this very question. We heard the following:

There are 2 separate entities or divisions of Parks Departments in Pima County.

1. *Parks & Recreation - where you see parks, pools, tennis courts, dog parks, etc....*
2. *Natural Resources Parks and Recreation. These parks are strictly designated as Natural Resource Parks. You will never see any "recreational" type entities in these parks. No courts, no pools, no band stands, no dog parks, etc.*

Canoa Hills Trails Park is designated as a Natural Resources Park. As such, it will never have any of the entities described above. Therefore, no dog parks can be built at Canoa Hills Trails because of its specific designation as a Natural Resources Park.

IT TAKES A PACK!
